Educational Events Recap

In 2025, the WCCD was pleased to offer **13 educational opportunities** for area residents and farmers, attracting nearly **250 participants**. We also enjoyed interacting with more than **500 attendees** at co-hosted events, partner events, and conferences. These opportunities included:

- Agroforestry 101 An introduction to Agroforestry practices like windbreaks, and silvopasture at Whitney Farmstead.
- Fireman's Park Tree Planting Volunteers learned how to properly plant ball and burlapped trees to increase air quality, manage stormwater, provide habitat, and beautify the park in Superior Township.
- How to Assess, Manage, & Preserve Your Land A traveling presentation with a collective of partner organizations. Online resources are available at washtenawcd.org/landtoolkit.
- Washtenaw Conserved Farm Tour A tour of three working farms that have leveraged
 Washtenaw County millage dollars for land preservation or natural resource management.
- Washtenaw Field Day Held at Gateway Farm in Plymouth focused on regenerative orchard production and strategic water management, including a rain garden demonstration.

Milkweed Giveaway Recap

Thanks to a reoccurring \$5,000 donation, over **1,032** attendees at the Native Plant Expo and Marketplace (NPEM) received **2,316** free plants of various milkweed species (Asclepias spp.), which is critical for the lifecycle of the endangered Monarch Butterfly (Danaus Plexippus). Look for the return of this giveaway in 2026 at the NPEM, likely with new plant species to support even more pollinators!

2025 School and Community Habitat Grant



The WCCD's School and Community Habitat Grant (SCHG) supports schools and community groups in obtaining native plants and creating wildlife habitats. Since its inception in 2021, the program has awarded over \$26,000 in consultation and plant materials to 21 awardees.


Farmer Cost-Share Report



Since its launch in 2021, WCCD's
Farmer Cost-Share has supported a
wide range of conservation practices,
including more than 700 acres of cover
crops and over 32 acres of pollinator
habitat. The program has assisted
almost 50 producers and landowners
in advancing their conservation goals
while reducing environmental risks.

In 2025, the program assisted 9 producers and landowners. Notably, one project included soil testing on 200 acres of row crops to determine

optimal nutrient application—resulting in cost savings for the farmer and reduced nutrient runoff into local waterways. Several other projects benefited **over 26 acres of forestland** through invasive species control, timber thinning, forestry



mulching, food forest establishment, and the development of a comprehensive Forest Management Plan.

The program is shifting to a single annual application deadline on December 1, 2025, providing participants with more time to implement their projects. However, if you missed the deadline, we encourage you to contact WCCD—additional assistance options may be available.

Conservation Technical Assistance Summary


WCCD administers the Michigan Agricultural Environmental Assurance Program (MAEAP) as well as the new Regenerative Agriculture Program (RAP) in Washtenaw County. MAEAP is an innovative, proactive program that helps farms of all sizes and all commodities voluntarily address agricultural pollution risks such as overapplication of fertilizers, applying fertilizers/pesticides too close to open water or wetlands, manure storage

issues, etc. Reducing these risks is especially important in Washtenaw County, which lies in the Great Lakes drainage basin. Although farm operations are still the heart of MAEAP, many landowners are also realizing the importance of proper stewardship of their forest and wetland habitats by participating in the Forest Wetland Habitat (FWH) System of MAEAP. In 2025, a total of 11 reverifications and 12 new verifications occurred on 9 farms and properties totaling approximately 2,000 acres.

Similarly, RAP encourages an active approach to land management by restoring and safeguarding healthy soils. This new program assessed and tested the biological health of soils in three areas at *4 farms*. The collected data will inform management plans on how to improve the soil biology and structure through practices such as conservation tillage and cover crops.



2025 Risk Reductions (N=85)

A risk reduction practice identifies and prevents potential pollution, such as testing soils for Phosphorous levels and erecting fencing to limit livestock access to water bodies.

Introducing the "Washtenaw Tool Bank Collective"

Our free tool lending library has grown and has a new and improved website! Together with Growing Hope Urban Farm (Ypsilanti), we now offer **over 80 tools** for both conservation and small-scale agriculture and gardening! New tools include: 6 loppers (donated by U-M SEAS), 3 sod cutters (2 donated by Washtenaw County Water Resources), soil pH tester, fruit tree grafter, and bag seeder.

The Stewardship Network, in collaboration with the Lily Pad Fund for Nature, funded: a wheel hoe & standing soil blocker (pick-up at Growing Hope); a mattock hoe, shrub grubber chain, and tree girdler (pick-up at WCCD); and more PullerBears for future tool banks!

We continue to offer tractor implement rentals including our Tree Seedling Transplanter and a No-Till Seed Drill, and some unique herbicide application tools in collaboration with the JLW CISMA. Our tool banks enable residents to engage with land stewardship via accessible resource sharing and education.

TO PLACE AN ORDER

Orders can be placed in two ways:

- **2) Enclosed paper forms:** Remove and complete the "2026 Spring Tree & Shrub Sale Order Form" and/or the "2026 Spring Native Plant Sale Order Form". Submit the form(s) with FULL PAYMENT (check or money order), including SALES TAX to the WCCD office by the pre-order deadlines. No phone orders accepted.

Order early for best availability. Orders will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis while supplies last. The WCCD reserves the right to cancel orders and refund payments due to supplier issues or other reasons beyond our control.

SHIP Sets Sail

In 2025, WCCD, along with neighboring Monroe, Lenawee and Hillsdale Districts, partnered with the Michigan Department of EGLE to launch the Soil Health Investment Program (SHIP). The program, funded by a Great Lakes Restoration Initiative grant, brought several million dollars to Michigan's portion of the Western Lake Erie Basin, enabling farmers to strengthen their nutrient, soil health, and water management strategies. With rising fertilizer costs and growing environmental concerns, producers are increasingly aware of the need to apply nutrients only where they are truly required. However, achieving this level of precision demands extensive soil testing and costly equipment.

SHIP helps bridge this gap by offsetting the financial burden of adopting advanced technologies and adjusting management practices. In Washtenaw County, **8 farmers are conducting intensive soil sampling across more than 2,000 acres of cropland**. Several participants have already used program funds to modernize equipment, allowing them to apply fertilizer with far greater accuracy. SHIP also supports a range of

conservation practices, including planting cover crops, reducing tillage, and installing grassed waterways to limit soil and nutrient runoff, and harvestable buffer strips. So far, more than 11.5 acres of harvestable buffers have been installed.

With over \$300,000 awarded in Washtenaw County thus far, SHIP is making substantial progress in improving agricultural sustainability. We look forward to building on this success in 2026.

NRCS Recap

The Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) is the USDA's primary private lands conservation agency providing technical assistance and cost-share to support landowners in addressing natural resource concerns. The WCCD partners with NRCS to provide one-on-one consultation with landowners and drive impactful stewardship through the: Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), and Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP).


In 2025, the NRCS office and WCCD's Natural Resource Technician collectively **obligated** \$756,551 in funding and enrolled 845 acres in conservation across the county. The WCCD technician supported more than 45 applicants through enrollment, site visits, conservation planning, and implementing conservation practices.





This ongoing partnership improves access to Farm Bill technical assistance and cost-share dollars and helps farmers and landowners put practical, long-term conservation into action throughout Washtenaw County. Key practices include establishing pollinator habitat, planting cover crops,

constructing high tunnels, adopting conservation tillage, and improving forest management. Together, these efforts protect soil, water, and wildlife while strengthening the resilience and productivity of local farms, ensuring that our working lands remain healthy and sustainable for generations to come.

Transition to Organic Partnership Program (TOPP):



WCCD completed its 3rd year as a partner on the Michigan TOPP. This cooperative agreement, part of the USDA's Organic Transition Initiative. is part of a nation-wide effort to expand organic agriculture

knowledge and marketing, and bolster the industry supporting organics.

The Michigan TOPP team is a partnership of statewide organizations including Michigan State University, MSU Extension, Michigan Food and Farming Systems, Grand Traverse Conservation District, Keep Growing Detroit,

Crosshatch Center for Art and Ecology, The Real Organic Project and Organic Seed Alliance.

In 2025, WCCD's TOPP team participated in the coordination of 40 farmers from Southeast Michigan, pairing certified organic farmer mentors with transitioning farmer mentees, for a total of 800 hours of paid



farmer-to-farmer learning and skill sharing. They also helped to coordinate 3 on-farm field days, 6 webinars, and 2 conference panels statewide, addressing farmer and educator needs around organic agriculture.

JLW CSIMA Recap

The Jackson, Lenawee
Washtenaw Cooperative
Invasive Species
Management Area
(JLW CISMA) is an invasive
species focused organization covering three
counties. Funding from



the Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program, Department of Natural Resources, Jackson County and the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative allows us to survey and manage invasive species, assist residents in identifying unknown flora and fauna; provide training opportunities to partners, non-profit organizations, and local staff; and create a variety of educational materials. This year, the JLW CISMA held three free training sessions and tabled at native plant expos in Jackson, Lenawee and Washtenaw. The JLW CISMA had over 1,380 active impressions, over 70,600 passive impressions (email, social media, mailings etc.), surveyed 307 acres, and performed management activities on almost 4 acres.
